








The Early Literacy Project (ELP) - India



- As a result, 840,000 citizens signed up for classes and in one decade, the birth rate of Mexico dropped by 34%.




Agricultural Productivity





Simple Treatments - Diarrhea

- Diarrhea is the second highest cause of death in Infants
- By creating a simple oral rehydration solution comprised of salt, sugar and water, the death toll dropped from 5 million in 1993 to 1.1 million in 2009
- This has saved 50,000,000
 children in the last 25 years



More than two-thirds of children not immunized across the globe live within just 10 countries




WHY?



HIV/AIDS



- 34 million people around the world had HIV in 2010
- About 50% were women, 10% were children under age 15.


Smoking

- About 6 million people died in 2012 of tobacco-related illnesses, more than from any infectious disease including AIDS



Total Chart represents Annual World Military Expenditures: \$780 billion








 Amount that was needed to eradicate Smallpox from the world (accomplished 1978); \$300 million
